SHURLEY ENGLISH Punctuation Rules

Punctuation rules include three sections; End Marks, Commas, and Periods.

END MARKS

1. A Period (.): Use a period at the end of a sentence that makes a statement.

For example: Mom baked a cake.

2. A QUESTION MARK (?): Use a question mark at the end of a sentence that asks a question.

For example: Are you going to town?

3. AN EXCLAMATION POINT (!): Use an exclamation point at the end of a sentence that shows

strong feeling.

For example: *That bee stung me!*

COMMAS

4. TIME WORDS: Use a comma between the day and the year.

For example: *July 15, 2014*

5. PLACE WORDS: Use a comma between the city and state.

For example: I will go to Tampa, Florida.

6. CLEAR MEANINGS: Use a comma to separate words in a series.

For example: We had milk, crackers, and soup.

7. CLEAR MEANINGS: Use a comma to separate the name of a person directly spoken to (noun of

direct address) from the rest of the sentence.

For example: Mom, do you want some tea?

PERIODS

8. ABBREVIATIONS: Use a period after the abbreviations of most titles and initials.

For example: Mr., Ms., Dr., Capt., St., Ave., St. Louis, C. J. Smith, John L. Jones
