Latin III Syllabus

Salve! Welcome to my Latin III class! I am looking forward to working with you this year as we move our way into the finer points of Latin grammar and begin our work on reading REAL LATIN! First, please read this course description; then share it with at least one parent/guardian and ask her or him to sign at the end next to where you have signed.

Course Objectives

- As with any class, the overarching goal is exemplary citizenship, character formation, growth in wisdom and virtue, and a deeper knowledge of the subject at hand.
- Students will read Latin stories and consume Latin vocabulary while they master advanced grammar concepts and gain an inspiring perspective of Roman culture and history.
- Students will *read about Roman culture and history* in English as well as Latin; and students will *share their own thoughts in writing and spoken presentations* about what they are learning.
- Students will develop an understanding about how the classical civilizations of ancient Greece and Rome have impacted our modern American society (in such areas as government, laws, language, literature, arts, and sciences).

Expectations

• A TITAN'S CREED forms the basis for class expectations.

Evaluation

- Each semester, each student's **points** will accumulate for daily work, homework, quizzes, tests, a project, and the semester exam.
- At the beginning of class every day, students will complete a piece of their **Prima Opera** page, (often warm-up/review exercises and composition). This will function as a participation grade.
- Students will be expected to keep everything in a portfolio and frequently reflect on their own learning.
- Expect **homework** almost every night—although it may not be something you write to turn in, you should be doing some sort of Latin study each night (such as vocab or grammar study).
- Frequent **quizzes**, usually one or two per week, will challenge students to keep up with their studies and will reveal where further study and practice are essential.
- **Tests** will occur periodically over a few to several lessons.
- Each semester project will be assigned with clear guidelines and plenty of time for completion.
- The **semester grade** will be broken down into these categories: Projects = 10%, Final = 15%, Unit Tests = 15%, Homework = 30%, Quizzes = 30%
