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The Classical Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado 11th Grade U.S. History Syllabus

Course Design: The U.S. History course at TCA is designed to provide a twosemester survey of American history from Jamestown through the 20th century. The course will challenge the reading, writing, and analytical skills of students enrolled. Critical thinking and analysis will be emphasized. Students will examine and interpret a textbook, as well as original documents. Testing will stress writing. Other assessment techniques will also be used. Students must come to class each day prepared to participate in classroom discussion of the reading assigned the night before.

Class Structure: The U.S. History course at TCA typically meets for 50 minutes each day of the school year. Daily classes stress the Socratic method to aid in the learning process. Classroom lecture, writing exercises, and oral presentations are also utilized to enhance the learning environment.

Course Objectives: Students will

- master a broad body of knowledge related to U.S. History
- demonstrate an understanding of historical chronology
- use historical data to support an argument or position
- interpret and apply data from original documents
- effectively use analytical skills i.e., cause and effect, compare and contrast and communicate analysis in well-written essays
- become familiar with topics defined in CO Content Standards for History (<u>http://www.cde.state.co.us/scripts/allstandards/COStandards.asp?stid=8&stid2=0&glid2=0</u>)
- work effectively with others to produce products and solve problems

Course Grading: The grading scale for TCA is as follows.

Classroom Expectations: Students are expected to come to class each day prepared to learn. Assigned readings must be completed <u>prior</u> to class to facilitate classroom discussion. Class participation enhances the learning process and will be a graded item in this course. Note taking skills are very important for success in this course. All assignments will be due on their assigned dates – *late work* will be reduced in score by the percentages listed below each day the work is late (all major assignments must be turned in even if no points are awarded, i.e. research paper project – identified by the teacher). *Sloppy or inappropriately completed work* will be returned to the student and must be redone (the same point reductions apply as for late work). Students are expected to abide by the Classroom Behavior guidelines listed in the Student Handbook.

Late work reduction percentages:

short-term homework – maximum 20% taken off if one day late; students may turn in the assignment for credit by the end of the unit/block of instruction.

long-term projects – the majority of work in U.S. History falls into this category (assigned at least 1-2 weeks prior to due date).

1-2 days late: 20% reduction on assignment

3 + days late: 0% on assignment

Course Quizzes / Tests / Projects / Final Exam: Students can expect a quiz in the middle of and a test after each unit. The essay portion of each test will be cumulative. *Students will be provided a study guide for each unit.* Understanding and retaining knowledge of the topics covered is key to success on the tests and final exam. Each semester will conclude with a final exam. Students will also be expected to complete the steps in the Hero Project each semester. Handouts on the specific requirements for each step will be provided in class.

Plagiarism / Cheating / Discussing Graded Assignments: Plagiarism is "using someone else's words or ideas without giving proper credit - or without giving any credit at all - to the writer of the original. Whether plagiarism is intentional or unintentional, it is a serious offense . . ." (from: Trimmer, Joseph. A Guide to MLA Documentation, 5th ed. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1999. 25.).
