## SCHOOL DISTRICT AND COMMUNITY CHARACTERISTICS

Colorado Springs is a thriving community with information and technology, military, tourism, and space technology ranking as the key industries within the economy. A new study ranked Colorado Springs among the top 30 fastestgrowing large cities in the nation. The metropolitan area crossed the 737,000 mark in population. ASD20 utilizes a K-5, 6-8, and 9-12 grade level configurations. The Classical Academy traditional divisions are K-6, 7-8, and 9-12.; home school students/part-time K-8; College Pathways (school code 060-241) 7-12--includes early college options through a dual enrollment program with PPCC.

## The Classical Academy

Mission Statement: The Classical Academy exists to assist parents in their mission to develop exemplary citizens, equipped with analytical thinking skills, virtuous character, and a passion for learning, all built upon a solid foundation of knowledge.

Motto: Excellence with Honor
Instructional Program Overview: Instruction emphasizes the logic and rhetoric stages of the Classical Trivium, while still addressing the content required to build the grammar basis of each subject. Teachers utilize Socratic questioning in a seminar format. Opportunities for real-life and hands-on experiences are incorporated as well. In subjects other than Math and Foreign Languages, the use of primary source documents, classical works, and materials written by experts in their fields are emphasized; textbooks are used for review and recall of basic information. Teachers guide and facilitate learning not only in the objectives of the subject matter, but also in the big ideas that encompass the subject matter. By integration and direct teaching, teachers emphasize virtuous character traits so that students have a foundation from which to make good life decisions.

Student Assessment and Grading: TCA uses a conventional grading system, although non-graded activities and character building opportunities are important as well.

Family/Community Involvement: Parent volunteering is expected and vital to the operation of the school. Students are also required to participate in several community service opportunities throughout their high school years.

History: The Classical Academy was founded in 1997. Our first class graduated in 2004. TCA earned $\$ 7$ million in scholarships in 2019. TCA is ranked by US News and World Report astop $41 \%$ of high schools in the nation, and in \#14 among schools in CO. Our $\$ 39.5$ million bond issue is the largest public financing for any single charter school in the United States. TCA is the largest charter school in Colorado. TCA's TCAP scores earned the John Irwin Award for Excellence 2019. ASD 20 "Accredited with Distinction" status by Colorado Department of Education. TCA exceeds CDE performance indictors in postsecondary workforce readiness and academic achievement.

TCA's Central, North and East traditional Elementary students matriculate to the North campus secondary program. The Central campus houses a K-6 program. The East campus houses a K-6 traditional, K-8 cottage program and a College Pathways program part time/full time 7-12 grades. The North campus houses a traditional K-12 program.

Class Rank: It is the policy of The Classical Academy not to rank our students. We believe the highly competitive nature of our school outweighs the benefits of ranking students.

TCA-specific GPA Policies: Outside courses not approved for meeting prerequisites or moving ahead in a sequence. Course work outside of TCA is not included in our GPA, but grades earned are listed on the transcript. Coursework can be retaken. Initial taking receives $\mathrm{P} / \mathrm{F}$ and no credit. Retake receives the actual letter grade earned and credit (if class is passed). Only courses taken during $9^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade years are included on the transcript. Many junior high students do take high school courses and subsequently move to the next level in high school.

Extracurricular Activities: National Honor Society and other student clubs; student government, interscholastic athletics, service opportunities, band, choir, debate and theatre
Class size: Average class size is approximately 20 students.
